before going to the us...

- How did you stard you musical career?
 Before going to the US I was a teaching middle school music education and I just graduated from the conservatory in Sassari
- Going from Bosa to Boston it's a pretty huge jump, what made you do that hard decision? As I graduated from the conservatory, I was hoping to have a musical career to be a performer. And I knew that I wasn't going to be able to pay my bills just performing and playingthe piano. So I was teaching, but I was also looking at maybe starting a nonprofit organization and organize concerts and organize festivals and so on. That didn't plan out because the politics in Italy are too hard. And so I decided to leave my country and I applied for a scholarship because it was the only way to get a student to get a visa. If I went to the US as a student, I got a scholarship from the Sardinian government to get my master's in piano performance. And I pursued that at the London School of Music.
- Who were you biggest supporters?

 My biggest supporters, my friends, my teachers, my parents supported me, meaning that they helped me out a lot financially because even though I had a scholarship, it was all on reimbursement after I would present receipts for the expenses. And so my father was always there and he's the one that really handled all the bureaucracy with the Sardinian government, with the Regione Sardegna, and he was certain of my biggest supporters, even if he was not a musical person.

What was you knowledge regarfing the English language before going to the us?

My english before I went to the US was not great, I travelled a lot and I had learned enough English in school but was only English to travel.

Before going to the US, as I said earlier, I traveled a lot. I went to Ireland, then I went to Spain multiple times. I went to England multiple times.

It was always English-speaking countries. And then I went to Australia on a really long trip. Those were all trips. Some of them to learn English, like the one in Ireland, I took an English course during the summer. All the other ones were really more for tourism than anything else, or visiting friends and having a lot of fun.
